



Amanda Misiko Andere - Chief Executive Officer Funders Together to End Homelessness

Amanda Misiko Andere, a dedicated leader for over 15 years, advocates for racial and housing justice in the nonprofit and public sectors. She's the CEO of Funders Together to End Homelessness and formerly led Wider Opportunities for Women. She serves on boards for the United Philanthropy Forum and Equity in the Center, while also playing a pivotal role in the National Racial Equity Working Group on Homelessness and Housing and the Leadership Council for the DC Partnership to End Homelessness. Amanda's work with A Way Home America focuses on ending youth homelessness with a racial equity perspective.



Ana Oliva - CEO National Alliance to End Homelessness

Ann Oliva is a renowned expert in homelessness and housing policy, collaborating with Congress, the Administration, and state and local officials to promote effective solutions and best practices in the homeless services sector. Her extensive career includes roles as Vice President for Housing Policy at the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities, a Senior Policy Advisor at the Corporation for Supportive Housing, and a decade of federal service at the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).



Bobby Watts - E.D. National Healthcare for the Homeless Council

Bobby Watts is the CEO of the National Health Care for the Homeless Council, which supports the 300 federally-funded Health Care for the Homeless programs and 150 Medical Respite programs with training, technical assistance, sharing of best practices, research, publications, and an active policy and advocacy program working to eliminate homelessness. Bobby has 30 years of experience in administration, direct service, and implementation of homeless health services



Branden Fletcher - Community Organizer Community Legal Aid Society

Branden Fletcher, a Gen-Z activist originally from Brooklyn and a Delaware resident for over a decade, co-founded the Courtroom Navigator program during his first term in Americorps in 2020. This initiative led to the Delaware Supreme Court allowing Qualified Tenant Advocates to represent tenants facing eviction, improving tenant legal support. He now coordinates the HOMES Campaign, advocating for housing justice in Delaware, and is a State Representative candidate in Wilmington's 3rd District.



Bree Taylor - Founder and CEO ATRICA

Bree Taylor is the founder and CEO of ATRICA, an organization that combines Activism and Technology to Report on Inequities in Communities and take Action. ATRICA provides end-to-end data services to empower individuals and organizations. Bree has over a decade of experience in data analysis, with a focus on life sciences, pharmaceuticals, and chemistry. She excels in client engagement, project management, and crossfunctional collaboration, with skills in data analysis, quality assurance, workflow optimization, and requirements definition.



Cori Bush - US Representative, Missouri's 1st Congressional District's United States Congress

Congresswoman Cori Bush is a registered nurse, community activist, organizer, single mother, and ordained pastor representing the people of Missouri's First Congressional District. Congresswoman Cori is in her second term in the United States House of Representatives, serving on the House Oversight Committee—including as Ranking Member on the Subcommittee on Economic Growth, Energy Policy, and Regulatory Affairs—and the House Judiciary Committee.



Caletta Harris - Director No Address Documentary, Reel2Real Productions

Caletta Harris is the founder of Reel2Real Productions, a full-service video production company located in Columbia, SC, and Atlanta, GA. She directed her first documentary series, "No Address," highlighting the criminalization of homelessness and practical solutions to combat it. The series garnered recognition, with "No Address: Columbia, SC" winning "Best Documentary" at the AfroSouth Film Festival and part two, "No Address: Atlanta, GA," selected as a quarter-finalist at the Pembroke Taparelli Arts and Film Festival.



Diane Yentel - President National Low Income Housing Coalition

Diane Yentel, as President and CEO of the National Low Income Housing Coalition, is a prominent advocate for equitable housing policies, leveraging over 25 years of experience in affordable housing. She has led impactful campaigns for housing justice, collaborating with Congress, the White House, federal agencies, and partners nationwide, often testifying before Congress and offering expert commentary to major media outlets.

Eric Tars - Senior Policy Dir.
National Homelessness Law Center

Eric Tars, Senior Policy Director at the National Homelessness Law Center, leads the organization's advocacy for housing as a human right and against the criminalization of homelessness. He's been involved in significant cases, including Martin v. Boise, and is a frequent media commentator. Prior to his current role, Eric was a Fellow with Global Rights' U.S. Racial Discrimination Program and holds a J.D. magna cum laude from Georgetown University Law Center and a B.A. magna cum laude in political science from Haverford College..



Iffat M. Walker - Founder and Executive Director Community Action NOW!

Iffat M. Walker is the dedicated Founder and Executive Director of Community Action NOW! (CAN), a remarkable nonprofit organization providing essential services across multiple regions, including the U.S. Virgin Islands, East Metro Atlanta, GA, and Ntonso, Ghana. With a passion for impacting positive change, Iffat has developed a diverse array of programs that focus on critical areas such as Disaster Management, Solar Affordability, Housing Assistance, Youth Diversion Services, Workforce Development and Financial Literacy, among others. Iffat's unwavering advocacy for the people she serves shines through her tireless efforts, consistently striving to improve the lives and well-being of individuals and communities in need.



Ishaan Akula - Advocate National Coalition for the Homeless

Ishaan Akula is a passionate advocate for sustainable social change through policy and entrepreneurship, striving to create a more equitable world by improving education and affordable housing access. He founded the Online Monmouth Math Competition (OMMC) during his freshman year, uniting students across the nation in collaborative math competitions. OMMC now engages over 3.8k students annually. Ishaan also co-developed Resilient, a platform aiding housing insecure and homeless individuals. He has partnered with the National Coalition for the Homeless (NCH) to mobilize youth for housing policy change, collaborating with campaign director Francis Kalombo Ngoy.



Jeffrey D. Bingham - Chairman Prince George's County Lived Experience Committee

Jeffrey Bingham, a nine-year advocate for the homeless, has held crucial roles in effecting change. He served as a housing specialist and director at Prince George's House Men Shelter, fostering relationships with landlords and organizations to aid homeless men. Now a permanent supportive housing case manager at Laurel Advocacy and Referral Services (LARS), he helps clients secure housing and resources, while also collaborating with the community.



LaToria Whitehead, Ph.D. MPH - Senior Advisor U.S. Department of Health and Human Services

As Senior Advisor for Environmental Justice and Health Equity at HHS, I leverage 18 years of CDC leadership to promote health equity and environmental justice, with a focus on underserved communities. My expertise includes managing large-scale projects, contributing to the establishment of the HHS Office of Environmental Justice, and utilizing innovative approaches to address humanitarian issues. My strengths lie in data evaluation and stakeholder collaboration to create lasting impact for vulnerable populations while supporting national leadership.



Lori Pampilo Harris - Consultant Wayfinders Consulting

Lori Pampilo Harris collaborates with all levels of government, elected officials, federal entities, Tribal Nations, Indigenous groups, and NGOs. Drawing from her Indigenous Pacific Islander and Filipina background, along with personal experiences of homelessness and poverty, she promotes collaborative governance. This approach fosters partnerships between government change agents and BIPOC communities to shape policies that prioritize racial and social justice, acknowledging the importance of building trust and addressing historical and contemporary harm in the pursuit of a revolutionary system.



Lynn Lewis - Social Justice Organizer

Lynn Lewis is a life-long social justice worker who believes in the power of collective analysis and direct action to win justice. She met the co-founders of Picture the Homeless in 2000 just after its founding, then worked with and learned from the incredible homeless leaders who together have built the only homeless led organization in NYC, and one of the few nationally, for seventeen years. She has since created the The Picture the Homeless Oral History Project: Don't Talk About Us, Talk With Us! in order to document the work of Picture the Homeless as well as other social movements, and to share those brilliant and nuanced organizing lessons.



Marisol Bello - Project Coordinator Housing Narrative Lab

Marisol Bello (she/her) has spent a career championing the stories and voices of people with lived experience, so they lead in creating the solutions that help every family thrive. First as a career journalist - most recently at USA TODAY - telling the stories of families working to make ends meet, and then in the nonprofit world, where she led narrative strategies to change hearts and minds about those living on the brink and move people to action.

Mark Horvath - Filmmaker InvisiblePeople.TV

Mark Horvath is a pioneering force reshaping perceptions of homelessness. As an activist, filmmaker, and social media explorer, he uses his four decades of leadership and marketing expertise to drive social change. Through Invisible People, a nonprofit he founded, Mark's authentic storytelling approach reaches millions, shedding light on homelessness, challenging stereotypes, and inspiring empathy and action.



Mike Brickner - Executive Director ACLU of Delaware

Mike Brickner assumed the role of Executive Director at the ACLU of Delaware in May 2020. Previously, he served as the Ohio State Director of All Voting is Local, where he led efforts to combat voter purges, secure voting rights for jailed individuals, and address issues with provisional ballots in Ohio. Brickner also held the position of Senior Policy Director at the ACLU of Ohio for 14 years, contributing to various civil liberties causes such as criminal justice reform, reproductive healthcare access, LGBTQ rights, and more.



Paul Boden - Director Western Regional Advocacy Project

Paul Boden currently directs the Western Regional Advocacy Project (WRAP), a coalition formed 18 years ago to unite social justice organizations addressing homelessness on the west coast. He faced homelessness at 16 in NYC after his mother's death and began volunteering at Hospitality House in San Francisco in 1983. Later, he worked with the mentally ill, highlighting the need for grassroots community organizing. Paul served as Director of San Francisco's Coalition on Homelessness for 16 years, contributing to the development of accountable community representation, a model seen in WRAP's current work.



Rajni Shankar-Brown MA, MBA, PhD - President of Board National Coalition for the Homeless

Dr. Rajni Shankar-Brown is an internationally renowned Professor and Endowed Chair of Social Justice Education at Stetson University, Vice President of the National Coalition for the Homeless, author, consultant, coach, poet, artist, and equity activist. She leads initiatives like the Poverty and Homelessness Conference, serves as Co-Chair of Equity and Justice for the International Society for Teacher Education and Information Technology, advises New York University's Moral Courage Project, and co-directs the Acts of Kindness and Justice Movement.



Ruth Jones Nichols Ph.D. - Deputy Assistant Secretary for Public Engagement United States Department of Housing and Urban Development

Dr. Ruth Jones Nichols is a proven leader who has thoughtfully designed and implemented programs within communities that have informed legislators, rallied community leaders, uplifted the voices of the people her organizations have served and inspired public action and support. Dr. Jones Nichols was previously the Chief Movement Officer at Feeding America, and led organizations in her native Norfolk, Virginia. Dr. Jones Nichols holds a doctorate in social work from the Catholic University of America, a master's degree in social work from the University of Pennsylvania, and a bachelor's degree in sociology from the College of William & Mary.



Stacey Matthews - Senior Technical Assistance Provider The Cloudburst Group

Stacey Mathews is an accomplished data management expert with almost two decades of experience in nonprofit and homeless services organizations, focusing on advancing analytics and equitable practices. Her background spans service delivery, project management, and human services data management, and she has collaborated with numerous communities to implement data-driven systems to reduce homelessness. Since joining Cloudburst in December 2020, Stacey has been working with the Department of Housing and Urban Development to enhance communities' data quality and reporting, emphasizing outcomes-driven services.



Sue Watlov Phillips - Activist MICAH, National Coalition for the Homeless

Sue Watlov Phillips is deeply devoted to her faith and serving the Lord through her passions for Social Justice and Equity, love for others, and ensuring everyone has access to safe, decent, and affordable housing. With extensive qualifications, including a B.A. in Psychology and a Master's in Counseling and Psychological Services, she has dedicated over 55 years to social justice work, particularly in assisting those at risk of homelessness and housing crises. Sue played a pivotal role in creating Elim Transitional Housing, a pioneering transitional housing program and prevention/rapid rehousing model in the early 1980s, serving as its Executive Director until 2012. She is also an author with expertise in addressing the needs of homeless patients with opioid use disorders.

Guided by individuals who have personally faced homelessness, this campaign prioritizes the advancement of federal legislation that addresses the complex issues contributing to the enduring problem of homelessness that has persisted in the United States for decades.
